Of great interest was the original guest book used at the 60th wedding anniversary of Capt. and Mrs. B. J. Kendrick. This book was presented "To Grandma and Grandpa from Minnie (Kendrick) and Marjorie (Kendrick Kruger), Dec. 28, 1905", and bears most of the autographs of the guests at the celebration. This book is in a remarkably good state of preservation and was used for registering the 58 attending the 1962 reunion. We want to thank Lillian Buster Armstrong of San Carlos, Calif. for sending this book, and also the clipping of the celebration from the 1905 edition of the Waco Tribune. Charles W. Kendrick felt that each family should have a copy of this clipping and has donated the money to reproduce it and send it along with this letter to each of you 100 addressees. He has done this in memory of his mother, Maggie Lee Kendrick, deceased of Amarillo. We appreciate his doing this very much--it is typical of the wonderful cooperation that many of you have shown in this whole project.

We appreciate the interest and help from the "in-laws". In fact, some of those "not of the blood" as they have sometimes been identified, have been the most helpful.
